One day, I remember, Grandad said to me, very seriously, "I want you to know, Gareth, I'll always be there for you." And I just said, "Cool" or something like that. But I liked him telling me that so much.

Grandad taught me how to make a tree-house and how to play pool and golf. Later we went to football matches and films and were always making jokes about each other. I did this wicked impression of him. First time he saw it he laughed. And he didn't just go, "Hee, hee." He put back his head and gave a deep, rumbly laugh.

10 Actually, he was the first person to encourage me to do my impressions. He said I had an ear for people's voices, just like some people have an ear for music (which I most definitely haven't'.)

Then, two and a half years ago, Mum, my older sister Lisa and me moved to a little village in Norfolk and Grandad came as well. He'd been living on his own for centuries (Grandma died before I was born) so it seemed a great idea for him to live with us too.

Other days, after school, I'd find Grandad in the kitchen cooking the meal. And I'd chat away to him for ages about...well, everything really.

I'll tell you my absolute favourite time with him, though: when I was all tucked up in bed and he'd come
in and tell me a story. He'd sit on this rocking-chair and I'd settle down, all snug and cosy, while he told me tales of 'ancient times' when he was an amateur wrestler.

Funnily enough, wrestling was the only interest Grandad and I didn't share. He'd tell me how it was the oldest sport in the world and that Henry VIII liked a good wrestle. Not to mention Richard the Lionheart, and ...oh, he'd reel off all these names. But I just wasn't convinced. I'd love hearing about Grandad's

25 wrestling experiences, though. He'd tell me how he used to watch these lads wrestling in the Town Hall on a Saturday afternoon and wish more than anything else that he could join them. He had the knowledge all right – he knew all the moves and throws and how not to fall on your head (very, very important). But he just had not belief in himself.
